### Direct Descendants of ISAAC SR BURLESON



Don is a Grandson of Absolom. Don's Dad was seventeen when Absolom died. Don shares some stories with us from his fathers past-he said he didn't know if they were true but here they are.

Grandpa Absolom was stationed at Fort Fisher where they built a wall to keep yanks out. While there he was vaccinated for small pox. Days after being vaccinated, when the scab got ripe the Dr. would take a needle and remove the puss and stuff from around the scab and use it to vaccinate others. They could vaccinate 10 men on one scab! His grandpa got foolin' around and knocked his scab off. The Dr. gave him a fit and told him that scab was worth \$100. Grandpa told the Dr. it was over on the door if he wanted it!

The second story is about Red Hill Gold Mine. Absolom and two other men were partners. They would pack a hunch, sweet taters and other stuff and they would dig and dig, sometimes for days at a time, whenever they could spare time away from the farm, but they didn't find a thing. This day, they decided to move over to where some flint rock was. The tunnels were usually only big enough for one person at a time so they would take turns digging. After awhile, Absolom was ready to quit and go home and get the crops planted so he told the others to count him out! All of a sudden the man inside digging said, "What is this?" Absolom did not hesitate to say, "I'm in, I'm in, I'm in!"

One day as Jepatha was walkin' up the road by Ralph's farm, he had a handkercheif around his mouth. He was one who used bad language all the time, and it was a real cold day. Ralph (Don's Dad) asked, "Jep, you got a toothache?" Jep replied, "I've never had a toothache in my life and God yes, they're all goin' to hell!"

Don continued sharing information with us like Nora Almond had named him. He was the last of seven children and was Baby Boy Burleson. When he went on a cruise a few years ago, he had to get three proofs of who he was, including school records and two others to prove that he really was Baby Boy Burleson! His wife Oleama said she had to go to Cabarrus County to get her records because the Dr. that delivered her was drunk! She had to get proof of who she was, too.

Don also said his father had passed down a story from Absolom of how he took part in a mule team convoy that hauled rocks from Granite Quarry to Fort Fisher. These convoys were sometimes 4 to 6 miles long and traveled almost 200 miles. The rocks were put out into the water to keep ships from coming in too close.

Absolom's widow, Sarah Anne, lived with Don's Mom & Dad until she died in 1925.

His dad was 35 yrs. old and his mom was 18 when they were married.

Now 76, Dad is still gardening and we have the joy of watching him nurture and weed another generation as he teaches a grandson to drive a tractor, introduces a granddaughter to the pleasures of planting and anticipates the fruits of his labor -a joy as sweet and satisfying as the season's first ripe tomato. 


# Ralph and Letha's family



# Don Burleson Biographical Information

### Childhood on the farm



Born on July 5, 1931 to Ralph and Letha Treece Burleson in the Endy community, Don is the youngest of seven. His mom let his first cousin Nora name him, and she called him Don, not Donald. His middle name is Huston, which he passed down to his son and grandson.

Growing up on a farm, Don spent his young years running barefoot, picking cotton and doing whatever he was told to help the family survive. Like many others in rural Stanly County, the Burlesons lived in a small home that they heated with wood.

"I was about 10 years old before we had electricity and was grown before the house had plumbing of any kind," Don said. "We never owned a telephone."

His father was strict; his mother, thrifty and hardworking. They attended Pine Grove United Methodist Church.

"My parents were Christians, fair and good people.

They never worked a day at public work, but they put seven children through high school on the small farm that they bought from my father's father," Don said. "We didn't have much, but we were happy."

All seven children worked in the fields until dark, then ate supper and took care of their assigned chores. As the youngest, Don was tasked with helping his mother milk their two cows.

Their community was tight-knit. If someone was facing an extended illness, everyone pitched in to help, especially during harvest time. The Burlesons and their neighbors gathered at the needy family's home and pulled corn, picked cotton or whatever was needed until the job was done.

"There was little time for playing. On Sundays, we could play with the neighbors if we didn't get too loud. We lived on Lick Branch, but one thing was for certain: No fishing on Sunday. That was a no-no," Don said.

He and his siblings loved a good prank.

"Very seldom did our parents get mad unless a prank hurt someone's feelings or health. Most times, our parents laughed along with us," he said.

One of his favorite childhood memories is eating lunch at school.

"My mother packed us all the same thing: a large homemade biscuit with a piece of country ham and a baked sweet potato. If we didn't raise it, we didn't eat it," Don said.

He worked on the farm until graduating from high school, where he met his sweetheart, Oleamer Hatley. She was valedictorian of their graduating class of 17 members, the Endy Class of 1949. They married in December 1950 and moved into a small apartment in the attic of a home owned by Ezra Almond near Canton Church.

Don worked for Almond Brothers Poultry, but before long Uncle Sam would come calling.

### Two years in the U.S. Army

In early October of 1952, Don was drafted into the U.S. Army and reported to Fort Jackson in Columbia, S.C. A few days later, he and several busloads of soldiers were taken to Camp Rucker near Dothan, Ala., to become part of the A Battery of the 151st Field Artillery Battalion. Twenty-two of the men, including Don, were tapped for training as military police (MPs), while the rest were sent to Korea, where the division suffered heavy losses.

Don was an artilleryman but was also trained and worked as an MP. He first lived in the barracks, but after basic training was allowed to move off base and brought Oleamer to an apartment in Ozark, Ala., that they shared with a fellow soldier from Chapel Hill and his wife. The couples would become lifelong friends. The men worked 12-hour shifts standing guard at the gate, patrolling and

performing all types of law-enforcement duties. They made \$58 a month.

The women kept house and prepared meals on a shoestring budget, and the four played cards for entertainment, as they were unable to afford to go to movies or dine out.

In the spring of 1953, the men heard a rumor that they were among a group about to be deployed to Frankfurt, Germany. They did not want to go because they knew they would have to leave their wives behind and they had just a little over a year to serve, so they were hoping to stay stateside.

Before the deployment was announced, Don and his friend told the captain that they very much wanted to go to advanced MP training at Camp Gordon, Ga., and asked that they be allowed to do so immediately. The captain OK'd the assignment. So, given a few days leave, they took their wives home to North Carolina and then reported to



Camp Gordon, Ga., where they underwent further MP training. At summer's end, when they returned to Camp Rucker, they moved their wives back and took another apartment, later moving into a trailer in Daleville, Ala.



In the spring of 1954, Camp Rucker was to be closed, so everyone moved to Fort Benning, near Columbus, Ga. Both Don and his buddy had made sergeant by this time. They were honorably discharged in October of 1954, having served their requisite two years.

Once out of the military, Don said there were two things he would never again do if he could help it: sleep in a tent and stand in line for a meal. He has remained true to his word as the Burlesons were not ones to camp. When he took his family on vacation, he rented a beach house, often with Oleamer's sister and her husband, or stayed in a hotel. And no matter how great a restaurant's reputation, even now Don is not a fan of waiting in line for a table.

His time in the military, though short, left an impression on him. Sixty-five years later, he still recalls the names of many of his fellow soldiers and relates incidents — often humorous ones — in vivid detail.

### Home, work and family

Once home from the Army, Don and Oleamer built a house (which they still live in today) and started a family. While some people would say they raised three children, he would say they "reared" three children, because legendary Endy teacher Mrs. Claude (Margaret) Grigg instilled proper word usage in her students: "Corn is raised; children are reared!"

Cathy Donelle was born in 1955; Kim Huston in 1958; and Luanne Renee in 1964.

Don became a Linotype operator and worked in printing for more than three decades, driving back

and forth to Charlotte five days a week for many of those years. In addition, he bought a used Linotype machine, installed it in his basement and set type for area print shops on the side, often working until late at night, with Oleamer proofing copy.

When he wasn't at work or setting type at home, he spent time gardening and tinkering. He fixed whatever broke, took care of his vehicles and lawn and was always busy improving on his property, planting and pruning grape vines, cutting wood for a wood stove, installing solar panels, etc. All those years on the farm growing up had taught him much about how equipment works and what it takes to keep things running.



As he brought up his family with Christian principles and encouraged his children in their schooling, he also taught them not to borrow, to take care of what they had and to keep the owner's manual! Whenever presented with a malfunctioning toy or appliance, that remains his first question: Do you have the book on this? (His owner's manuals are filed for future reference and include the date he purchased the appliance, what he did over the years to service it, including the number of the part he had to order.)

Don took his family to church without fail, served on church committees and supported the community. He hunted doves, caught fish and worked hard to make growing up easier for his children than it had been for him. Although he doesn't play an instrument (he always says the radio is all that he knows how to play), Don has a wonderful bass voice and sang in the choir during his younger days. Oleamer plays piano by ear, and for many years, friends and neighbors would gather frequently at the Burleson home for some picking and grinning.

While Don battled severe back trouble on and off, undergoing five surgeries and long periods of recuperation, he refused to let it keep him down and always managed to go back to work.

As "cold type" and computers arrived, Don realized that his job as a Linotype operator would not last. He began to look for other work and found that his "fix-it" mentality and knowledge of machinery served him well as he went to work for Cargill in Albemarle performing maintenance on all their egg-processing equipment. He not only worked to keep the plant running, but would go out to their production farms and trouble-shoot the equipment that brought the eggs from the chicken houses to their packing rooms. His last role in the workforce involved machine maintenance in a textile plant. He retired in 1993.

# Staying active

Don stayed busy after retirement, gardening and taking on a variety of projects, including repairing lawnmowers for friends and neighbors and making more than 100 canes out of curly wood, often harvested from the land he inherited between Parker and Burleson roads. He began giving so many of the canes away that he had to start keeping a list to remember whom he had given them too. Virtually every doctor who treated him over the years — from orthopedics to cardiologists, etc. — has a cane that he crafted.

In late 1989, Don had open heart surgery and later had some stints put in. He also has a pacemaker. Despite his health issues, Don and Oleamer kept an active social life and were members of a club called the Jokesters that included some of their schoolmates and a variety of couples from all walks of life. The group took trips on and off throughout the years and always hosted a New Year's Eve party. Don and Oleamer went on a cruise with the Jokesters and have fond memories of more than a few bus trips taken with the group.

Back at home, they made it their business to grow some of the finest tomatoes in the area in addition to okra, squash, cucumbers, peppers, peas, watermelons, etc. Each year Don says he is planting his last garden and doesn't anticipate being able to plant one next year, but with Oleamer's help he has somehow managed to do so. He put together a water-saving irrigation system to make his tomato-growing more efficient. And in recent years he has taken to planting sunflowers so he'll have seed for the birds he enjoys watching underneath their large willow oaks.

Another of his projects was to build a pecan sheller. He has always been able to look at machinery, see how it works and then build it, often improving on a certain aspect of its function. His shelling technique became well-known in the community for several years as people would bring their pecans to have them cracked. Whether dropping off pecans or buying tomatoes, they would often sit and talk to the Burlesons in their basement and be treated to one or more of Don's stories.

### A teller of tales

"Did I ever tell you about the time ...?" Anyone who has spent more than a few minutes with Don has probably heard this question. No matter the answer, a story is to follow, since, like many Burlesons, he seems always to have an appropriate anecdote at the ready.

Many of his stories are about growing up — remembering his first taste of Coca-cola, the time he should have gotten a whipping for upsetting a yellow jacket nest but didn't, or the thrill of throwing tops. He describes the scene on molasses-making day when his brother Kenneth was running with a skimming paddle in his mouth and fell, nearly cutting off his uvula, and he recounts the drama of his sister Maxine's first attempt at baking biscuits. (She had made them perfectly round, but was devastated and ran crying from the table when her Daddy asked someone to roll him one of those biscuits.) As the youngest and only surviving child of Ralph and Letha Burleson, he has been a keeper of his siblings' stories for many years as well.

He has stories about his Army days: nearly passing out while guarding a soldier who was undergoing a spinal tap and getting shouted down by an officer while he was painstakingly trying to remove a tiny piece of eggshell from a huge pot of soon-to-be scrambled eggs. And he has stories about his days in printing, including one in which a co-worker received a counterfeit bill when he cashed his paycheck at the bank during lunch and before nightfall had his home searched top to bottom by the Secret Service. (Apparently a counterfeit bill in the hands of a printer was not to be taken lightly.)

They don't travel far these days, but they love having visits and still get to church most Sundays. They remain fiercely independent — another Burleson trait — and still do more for their children than their children do for them.




